

Sunday Readings Reflections of 1/10/2016**Reading 1 Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7**

Today's reading might be called Jesus' theme song, even though it was written long before his birth. Known as one of the four "suffering Servant Songs" in the Old Testament, this reading describes someone who sounds exactly like Jesus. And Jesus himself quotes some of these lines from the prophet, who was probably describing Israel itself. By accepting his own suffering and remaining faithful to God, Israel could be "a light for the nations." For us, the reading is an inspiring portrait of Jesus, the Suffering Servant, who humbly brings justice, freedom, and peace to God's people.

Reading 2 Acts 10:34-38

Today the Roman centurian Cornelius and his fellow converts to Christianity are delighted to hear the apostle say that "God shows no partiality." Some of the early Jewish Christians believed that the good news of Jesus was intended only for the Jews. But Peter insisted that Jesus' mission was to all nations. He pointed to the Baptism of Jesus as the beginning of his ministry, the day when he was "anointed with the Holy Spirit and power."

Gospel Luke 3:15-16, 21-22

We all want to be recognized for who we really are. Today's gospel reading describes that memorable day when Jesus had the joy of being recognized by John the Baptist and approved by God as "God's beloved Son." Although Jesus did not need to be baptized (since he was without sin), he wanted to identify himself as closely as possible with God's people.

Take a few minutes today to be thankful for your Baptism. Ask Jesus to help you recognize yourself more deeply as a beloved daughter or son of God.

Pastor's Column


Dear Parishioners:

With a New Year almost upon us, a simple resolution would be to love God more faithfully and let it show it how we are more loving to our neighbors. At first reading that might seem so obvious but we tend to forget at times that the more lovingly faithful we are to God then inevitably we become more loving to our neighbors. Holy Oneness with Christ has a life-changing impact on our distorted views about our neighbors. The thought that God loves every person in the “Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world” is a startling sacrament of Eucharist awareness that is proclaimed to us at every Mass. To eat the Body and Blood of Christ is to swallow God’s Love for all people. This is the cost of loving God deeply because then we can’t be selective about which neighbors we love.

It is true that we can love some people more easily than others until we get on the “Lamb of God” level of our Beloved Jesus. Here we notice that Jesus’ love for humanity is on the mercy and forgiveness level. And so more specifically, our New Year’s resolution ought to include something about treating people with more mercy and forgiveness. We cannot avoid this reconciling life-changing direction because it is God’s Will for us. Let us spend some time with “forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us” this New Year. Humbly admitting that we can only be faithful to God’s love for all people in Christ by loving God deeply is a simple and yet life-changing resolution for us as January approaches. This particular resolution continues to remind us that the core of being Jesus’ disciples is mercy and forgiveness.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the next few weeks, if you were to stroll around Prague or Budapest or Kraków, you might see curious graffiti scratched in chalk over some doorways:

"20 C M B 16." The families dwelling behind those doors have celebrated the Epiphany door blessing. They have gathered before the feast-day meal, probably after Mass, and the head of the family has traced the sign of the cross on the piece of chalk. Standing on a ladder, the leader traces the numbers for the new year, and the letters C M B for Christus Mansionem Benedicat, Latin for "May Christ bless this house." The letters also point to the names that tradition has assigned to the mysterious magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar--although scripture tells us nothing of their number, their country, or their names. The blessing speaks of journeys ended and journeys begun at the doorway, and prays that all journeys be as satisfying as was the magi's. It prays that the house beyond the door have the quality of love and peace that the magi marveled at when they at last arrived in Bethlehem. In some countries where the Soviet Union tried to impose a harsh atheism, the vigor of this household custom survived all efforts to erase Christian customs. In the years of struggle, the chalked blessings were a pervasive sign of defiance, and now in the light of new freedoms, they are a sign of the resilience of our tradition and the fulfillment of the magi's quest for meaning and peace.
