

Sunday Readings Reflections of 8/23/15**Reading 1 Joshua 24:1-2a, 15-17, 18b**

Parents sometimes use "reverse psychology" to encourage their children to make the right choices. That is what Joshua, the new leader of the Israelites, does in this reading. He wants them to make a firm commitment to serve God alone. So he tells them that they can choose to serve other gods. However, he insists that he and his family will remain faithful to the one God who brought the Israelites out of slavery.

By reminding the people of all God has done for them, Joshua guides the tribes of Israel to be faithful to the Lord. When we remember all that God has done for us, we too renew our faith in the God who saves us.

Reading 2 Ephesians 5:21-32

If Saint Paul had any idea how much confusion his letter to the Ephesians might cause centuries after it was composed, he might have re-written it. His primary message is that the relationship between Christ and his Church is like a human marriage. Husbands and wives are "made into one," just as Christ and his Church are one body. Marriage partners are called by God to show mutual love, respect and care. In doing so, they reflect the love Jesus has for all who follow him.

When husbands and wives choose to make sacrifices for each other and their children out of love, they are acting like Jesus who sacrificed himself out of love for his Church.

Gospel John 6:60-69

What a sad day it would be if some of our friends suddenly turned against us because of our religious beliefs. Today's gospel story relates how many of Jesus' disciples left him. They could not accept his teaching that he himself was the Bread of Life. They could not believe that his Body and Blood were the source of eternal life. So they turned their backs on him and returned to their old way of life.

However, when Jesus asked the Twelve if they too would abandon him, Peter replied, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." We too at times may find some of Jesus' teachings difficult. When that happens, we speak to him honestly in prayer and seek his help.

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Pastor's Column

Dear Parishioners:

The most significant experience that we have in our earthly journey is God forgiving our sins. Christ the Savior of the World makes it clear to us that the new and eternal covenant of God's Love is founded in the forgiveness of sin. With a mustard seed size faith we realize that Jesus' death and resurrection is about forgiveness and new life. Perhaps we have noticed that Holy Communion with Jesus means Holy Communion with forgiveness. In our desire to receive Jesus' Body and Blood is the stirring implication that the Sacrament of Salvation is the Sacrament of forgiveness.

Anytime we forgive, we are experiencing Christ's saving oneness. To be one with Christ is to be one with our neighbors via forgiveness. It is easy to find a myriad of reasons for being divided about our neighbors; however, in living Christ, we realize that the peace of Christ flows out of his reconciling love. The new covenant of God's eternal love grows a little more here on earth anytime we forgive ourselves and others.

God is not a punishing God for God reveals through Jesus the Son of God made human, that God is forgiving. We are not to be presumptuous about God's mercy, but rather, we need to be humble and open to the continual change of heart that surfaces from our repentance/forgiveness. The most significant gift from God that flows from Christ's forgiveness of our sins is the blessed energy of Christ's peace. And more than likely, eternal life in Christ after our earthly journey will be eternally impacted by Christ's saving peace.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

If the alb is the premier baptismal garment, then why are there so many other styles of vesture in evidence in our parishes? In some places, altar servers and other ministers might wear a garment, usually black, called a cassock. Over that is normally worn a white garment (a “surplice”), reminiscent of the alb but much shorter, often of starched linen and trimmed with lace. The cassock is not a liturgical garment, but a clerical robe. Its origins lie in the religious habit of monks. By the late Middle Ages, diocesan priests and clerics increasingly were encouraged to emulate religious priests. Very small boys were often apprenticed to monasteries, especially for music education, and would be invested with a cassock and sometimes even inducted into the ranks of clerics.

For centuries before the Reformation, it was required that all men entering higher education be clerics, and so the cassock and its variations became familiar academic garb. At the Reformation, many ministers retained a form of the cassock as ordinary dress, rejecting liturgical garments. In the seventeenth century, the English Civil War was in part provoked by the Archbishop of Canterbury’s insistence that ministers wear surplices. Although the Episcopal Church now retains “cassock and surplice” as the normal dress for lay men and women assisting at liturgy, Catholics are increasingly attentive to the deeply traditional treasure of the alb, our baptismal robe, when special liturgical vesture is needed.
