

**Sunday Readings Reflections
of 9/27/15**

Reading 1 Numbers 11:25-29

Just as people sometimes envy their neighbor's posses-
sions, they may also envy the spiritual gifts of others.
This story about Moses is a wonderful example of a
religious leader who wanted to share his gift of proph-
ecy with many others. However, some of the Israelites
are jealous of Moses' gift. They want it to be kept by
the privileged few. Moses tells them that he wishes the
Lord would bestow his spirit on all the Israelites.

We can follow the example of Moses by sharing our
gifts generously in the Church, and by avoiding any
envy of those whose gifts may appear to be greater
than our own.

Reading 2 James 5:1-6

Once again Saint James is warning Christians about
practicing the faith they profess. The rich who crave
for expensive possessions and store up wealth for
themselves should fear God's judgment. Those who
gained their wealth by cheating their workers should
weep and repent. James compares those who live in
selfish luxury with calves fattened for the slaughter.

This harsh warning needs to be heard by all Christians
who live in a materialistic society. We are not to steal
from or cheat others of a just wage. Whatever money
and possessions we have are to be shared with those in
need. By doing so, we "store up riches in heav-
en" (Matthew 6:20).

Gospel Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

Like Moses before him, Jesus wants God's healing
power to be shared by as many as possible. When a
disciple complains about a man who is healing in Je-
sus' name but who is not one of their company, Jesus
assures him, "Anyone who is not against us is with
us." Doing good is not to be restricted to an exclusive
few. Giving good example to the "little ones" or those
of simple faith will be rewarded. Anyone who leads
them astray deserves punishment.

Since our hands, our feet, and our eyes can lead us
into sin, we are to use them in ways that honor God's
Kingdom of love, justice, and peace. By doing so, we
help to make God's reign visible in our midst.

Dear Parishioners:

Scripture was written a long time ago and sometimes it focused on the end of the world. There was a belief in 1st century A.D. that after Jesus' resurrection and ascension, that the end of the world would soon follow. But here we are 2000 years later and still no end to the world. Let us not fret about this delay because the fulfilling Love of God in Christ is already with us. We cannot improve on how deeply God Love's us now.

God has fulfilled His Saving Love Promise through Jesus' death and resurrection. This happened 2000 years ago! TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Toward the end of the second century, a churchman in North Africa, Tertullian, described an early form of penance. Imagine if it had survived! There were three steps to this very public ritual. The unfortunate sinner was brought before the community in an itchy garment of goat's hair. The communities of the day were small and intimate, and everyone knew everyone else. The shame of exposure for a big sin—murder, idolatry, or adultery—would have been profound. The penitent would beg the community for prayers of intercession, and then go sit in a place assigned to penitents. After this public confession, the penitent would be assigned some discipline, usually a relatively severe fast, or the wearing of distinctive garb. This remedy for sin was for a certain period of time, or at least until the bishop (every small community has its own bishop) judged that enough was enough. Then the person would be readmitted to the eucharistic community, although Tertullian doesn't tell us how. Probably the bishop tenderly placed his hands on their heads, precisely where they were anointed at baptism. We do know that the readmission of penitents to the eucharistic table became in some churches a great celebration, and there are records from Spain of bishops leading penitents in a dance-like processional into the eucharistic hall on Holy Thursday.


